Abstract

Producing high-quality, coherent, and harmonized statistics on tourism is considered one of the most important requirements to assist researchers, policymakers, and to stimulate the development of this sector.

To meet the growing demand for tourism statistics, INSTAT has initiated the production of accommodation statistics from the supply side, based on the European Union Regulation (EU) No. 692/2011. The results of this study are based on the Accommodation Structures Survey for the years 2018-2021 and will examine the processes involved in the production of indicators, including the design of the survey sample, data collection, processing, and presentation of findings from evaluations during this period.

Part of the analysis will also include the addition of the tourism accommodation offer based on the indicators of approved construction permits for hotels and similar structures, as well as statistics on employment in this sector.

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HOW ADMINISTRATIVE MEASURES TAKEN BY ROAD AUTHORITIES AFFECT THE NUMBER OF ACCIDENTS

Abstract

In recent years, the administrative measures implemented for the circulation of road transport vehicles have primarily focused on minimizing and preventing the number of road accidents. With a road network utilization of 3,606 km and a calculated density of 12.54 in 2021, enhancing pedestrian safety and overall road safety is essential. The study and documentation of violations or the main reasons for the suspension of driving licenses for vehicle operators serve as significant indicators in the formulation of national strategies for road transport safety.

The aim of this paper is to assess the impact of administrative measures taken over the years on the number of accidents occurring in the country (such as fines and license suspensions) and to analyze their sources. An examination of data on road accidents over the years indicates that a substantial percentage of accidents stem from driver behavior. This article will present evaluations of data provided by the General Directorate of State Police and analyzed by the Institute of Statistics (INSTAT) for the years 2018-2021.

The analysis of data over four years reveals that the number of administrative measures has indirectly influenced the number of road accidents, leading to a reduction in their occurrence due to an increase in implemented measures. The most significant measures target the use of alcohol or narcotics, violations of speed limits, disregard for road signs, and improper overtaking.
